The result of that call was a visit to their home in East Kildonan and an afternoon both Kuznia families will never forget. Leo and his wife, Gerda, had come to Winnipeg in 1953 from Europe. World War II had left Leo's family scattered in various countries in Europe, but only Leo had crossed to Canada. In those 18 years, he had never met another Kuznia. He said everywhere he had gone in Canada, he had not found the name, but his family in Europe had said there were supposed to be some in the States. He couldn't believe that only a little south of the border there could be so many.

Last Sunday, Leo, Gerda, and their four-year-old daughter, Diana, were weekend guests at the Mike Kuznia, Jr. home in Florian. They had been invited to the Philip Kuznia - Sarah Blazek wedding. Mr. and Mrs. Mike Kuznia, Jr. and Gina and Mr. and Mrs. Leo Kuznia and Diana attended the wedding and reception at Greenbush and visited at the Jerrie Blazek farm at Greenbush and also visited Mrs. Mike Kuznia's mother and grandmother at the Norbert Dostal home at Badger. They also attended the wedding dance in the evening. They found it hard to believe how many Kuznias they met.

Sunday afternoon was spent showing them the local area and Old Mill State Park before they left back for Winnipeg. They wish to say to all the Kuznias they met how happy they were to meet them.

The oldest brother, Aloyes, was killed three months after the war had ended. The second brother, Theo, changed his last name after the war, and the rest of his family now go by that name. The name is spelled more German, which made it easier to get work. A son of Aloyes Kuznia, T.H.W. Kuznia, lives in London, England. Wilhelm Kuznia lives in Zweibrucken, West Germany.

After Joseph Kuznia's wife, Helena, died, he remarried. To that second union, seven more children were born. They are living in West Germany, Poland, and Sweden.

LEO KUZNIA SON OF JOSEPH AND HELENA KUZNIA OF SILESIA, POLAND

In the old country where I lived before, in Poland, the province was called Silesia. In Polish, the name was Slask.

My father and mother came from Ratibor Kosel on the River Odra (in German, Oder). The land, before the first and second world wars, belonged to the Germans. After the war, however, it was given to Poland. It was a contract from Jalta.

My father's name was Joseph Kuznia. He was born March 19, 1877, in Birken Krs Kosel, Silesia. My mother's name was Helena Julianna Kuznia. Her maiden name was Wieczorek. She was born February 12, 1878, in Plania Krs Ratibor, Silesia. She died October 9, 1933. Her parents were Franzika (my grandmother) and Franz (my grandfather) Wieczorek.

From the Kuznia side of my family, my grandparents died very young, when my father was just a child. Because of this, I do not even know my Grandpa Kuznia's first name. Grandma Kuznia's name was Konstantine Kuznia. My father worked for the railroad for 45 years.

I. Leo Kuznia, was born July 9, 1922, in Mechnice (also spelled Moosdorf in German and Muchenitz). Mechnice is in the province of Opole, Poland. My occupation is painter and artist. I was in the army for four years and spent two and a half years as a prisoner of war. One year was spent in an American prison, where I painted a picture for an American Major in exchange for food. I was also in a French prison for a year and a half. I stayed for two and a half years after the war and worked for a wine farmer. In 1950, I went back to West Germany. In 1951, I met my future wife, Gerda Pallentien, and married her in 1952. In June of 1953, we came to Canada on a boat called "Anna Salam".


I last worked as a painter for the Canadian National Railroad until I was forced into retirement after major heart surgery. Gerda works for Hudson Bay Company. Since retirement, I have completed many paintings. In all, I have painted about 400 pictures.

A daughter, Bridget, was born to us December 1, 1965, but died December 3, 1965. She is buried at Elmwood Cemetery in Winnipeg, Manitoba. On March 30, 1967, a second daughter, Diane, was born.

We reside at 666 Greene Avenue, Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada.




Leo, Diane, and Gerda Kuznia of Winnipeg, Manitoba -- 1979

The first unofficial gathering was actually held in August of 1956 about 3½ miles up river from the present site of the Florian Park. There were numerous other gatherings of various sorts over the years up to the date of the formal organization as a club.

The members get together monthly at each other's homes for an official business meeting to discuss investment opportunities. Following the business meeting, there is always ample time for a game of cards, refreshments, a delicious lunch prepared by the host's wife, and, of course, no get-together would be complete without some reminiscing about old times, story telling, and a lot of laughter. In addition, it provides the members with "Florian roots" an opportunity to speak Polish, but someone always has to translate the story to the "tie breaker" from Sauk Centre.

There are many other activities held throughout the year, which include the wives, family members, friends, and other interested persons. Regular events include a picnic held each July at Turtle Lake in Shoreview, which has drawn people from Florian, Duluth, Chicago, and California. Plus, each September, there is a campout at the Rudy Kuznia farm north of Crown, Minnesota, and an annual Christmas party. Also, the group has attended smelting parties at the Roger Borowicz home, both in Duluth and Brooklyn Park.

The club has provided an opportunity not only for the members to stay in touch routinely, but also has helped strengthen family ties and friendships among the members' children.

Through the thirteen years of club existence to date, we have come to realize more deeply what a wonderful privilege it has been for most of us to have been reared in the Florian community and to have experienced a part of the wonderful heritage our forefathers established. We sincerely hope God grants us the strength and will to continue this heritage, to maintain these friendships, and that we can pass on to generations following us some of the goodness we received from our parents, grandparents, and everyone who established the original Florian community a century ago.

Kuznia Kolossal Four

In the summer of 1978, the golfing debut of the "Kuznia Kolossal Four" was made. It all began when four great players

named Kuznia from the Riverside Golf Club of Stephen decided to form a team that would take on other golf teams. The four Kuznias, Sandy, Gerri, Theresa, and Barb, became avid opponents; no challenge was too great.

On a late afternoon match, another team challenged them. Needless to say, the KK4 won the match. Being the good sports they said they were, they gave their winners' trophies to their opponents because they had nerve enough to play them. After all, there is not much you can do with a 39-cent trophy.

In 1979, they decided to have a "Polish Day" at their KK4 match. Their team was challenged by two teams. They treated all the ladies to Polish food, and during their lunch. they officially and legally adopted Donna Larson and renamed her Donna Mae Kuznia. Now they will be known as the KK4 + 1.

Florian Lake and Park

In the spring of 1976, after more than a decade of serious planning and 17 years since watershed planning was initiated, the Overton Structure of the Tamarac Watershed project was complete and began to hold back the water of the Tamarac River, one mile southwest of Florian, to form a permanent 50-acre lake.

The resultant lake prompted the formation of Marshall County's first park to be built around the lake. An area of about 40 acres surrounding the lake has been developed into a park which will include, when totally developed, boat dock, swimming facilities, camping area, and walking trails.

The dam cost \$430,000. Eighty-five percent was funded from federal sources and fifteen percent from local funds. The cost of the park facility is pegged at \$145,195, with fifty percent of this funded from federal sources and fifty percent from local funds, about 40 percent of which has been developed from state funds.

Twenty-five camp sites will be developed in the park with electrical hookups. Also, a bath house with running water. Many

deciduous and coniferous trees and seedlings have been planted in the park.

The lake will back up water about three-quarters of a mile to a mile from the Overton Structure normally and about half a mile beyond that for flood control needs.

The first manager of the park was William Kuznia. Ralph Kuznia is the present manager.

William Wright


WILLIAM WRIGHT THE NAMESAKE OF WRIGHT TOWNSHIP

West of the Joan and Edward Rogus home, less than a quarter of a mile, across the river on the south bank of the Tamarac River is the unmarked grave of William Wright. Wright came to Marshall County about the year 1879 and built a small cabin on the bank of the Tamarac River on the $N^{1/2}$ of Section 18, now known as Wright Township. His only companion was a large dog which shared his cabin with him. He had constructed a rude cot of poles, and to this

he kept his dog tied at night.

Sometime in 1881, Mr. Wright died. The dog, either from hunger or realizing that something was wrong, gnawed the pole to which his leash was fastened, then gnawed his way out of the door and went to the home of a neighbor some distance away. The neighbor realized something was wrong and set out for the cabin and found the lifeless body of Mr. Wright. A coffin was made, and he was buried in the cabin. There was no floor in the cabin, and the ground was frozen so hard that it was difficult digging. Consequently, the depth reached was barely sufficient to permit the coffin to be covered.

Two-Year Transformation Job

Rock Garden Now Shrine

About two years ago, a South St. Paul man decided to dismantle a large rock garden in his yard.

But Thomas J. Wilebski, 900 Fifth Avenue South, was hesitant in starting the job because he couldn't think of what to do with the hundreds of rocks that had accumulated in the garden

over the years.

"I didn't know what to do with them until a year ago last summer when my wife and I took an auto trip to West Bend. Iowa, and visited the Grotto of Redemption shrine," Wilebski said.

The massive and ornate shrine, made of concrete and rocks, which took the late Fr. P.M. Dobberstein 43 years to construct, so impressed Wilebski that "I started planning the future of my rock garden right away."

The result of his inspiration now stands in place of the garden -- a monument 12 feet wide, 16 feet long, and 12 feet high in the center, complete with a cornerstone which reads: Shrine of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Wilebski, 74, a retired carman for the Rock Island Railroad, put the finishing touches on the shrine recently. A priest blessed the monument last week.

It took Wilebski eight months of work to complete the shrine, doing it all himself. He began it in September 1958, stopped work during the winter, and started again last June.

The shrine is made entirely of stones, rocks, and sea shells

imbedded in concrete. It contains three coves, one a manger scene, another dedicated to the Virgin Mary, and the third and largest is dominated by a 34-inch statue of Christ. The statue is 70 years old.

The cove containing the statue of Christ is large enough for a man to stand inside. All the coves are illuminated, and along the front base of the shrine are two rows of colored lights, encased in large sea shells.


"All the rocks didn't come from the garden, though," Wilebski said. "Some of them came from Europe and were sent by a grandson in the army there. Some rocks we got in Duluth and from around here. The sea shells came from California."

Wilebski said he has no idea how many rocks went into the monument.

"I couldn't even begin to guess. It seems like there were a million of them."

The shrine contains more than 50 statues. The Virgin Mary statue is 22 inches high and 100 years old. Over each cove is a cross made of concrete by Wilebski.

"It was a lot of fun building the shrine," Wilebski said. "But I sure am glad it's finished."





Will the "Real" Kuznia Please Stand Up!

Since all the planning for this Kuznia Reunion first started. efforts have been made to seek out Kuznia families not of our family line -- the direct descendants of Albert and Hedwig. We have written many different places, inquiring how we might possibly find out if other Kuznia families exist in the United States or Canada. Since many records are confidential, nobody could help us. Below is a reprint of a short article the Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, paper reprinted for us. It drew no response.

Man's Search For His Roots

In 1981, a centennial reunion of the Albert and Hedwig Kuznia clan in America is planned. Albert and Hedwig brought with them six children, and seven more children were born to them in America. From those humble roots the family tree has grown to 1,725 names. But the descendents of Albert and Hedwig Kuznia want to find more relatives!

Since the reunion steering committee started plans for the centennial reunion in 1978, it has been seeking information from all sources available, trying to find out if Grandfather Albert Kuznia had a brother or sister who also came to America. All their efforts so far

have been in vain.

Many older family members seem to recall their dads telling of another brother of Grandpa's who came to the U.S. and settled along the East Coast -they think in the Pennsylvania area.

A big centennial reunion celebration is being planned for the Fourth of July weekend in 1981. Why would anybody with 1.625 living relatives want to find more? That question is hard to answer. But it must be man's thirst to know more about who he is and where he came from.

We also tried the "Ask-It-Basket" of the Midland Cooperative paper and again drew no response. Probably of greatest interest as we take this book to be printed is a postcard Barb and Lawrence Kuznia received addressed to Kuznia Farms, Inc., inquiring if Kuznia was a family name or a business name. He signed the card "J. Kuznia, Lorain, Ohio". Is there a J. Kuznia in Lorain, Ohio? Maybe we will know by the time of the Reunion.

John A. Kuznia also tells of Canadian travelers who some years ago said there were Kuznias in Ontario that came there from Pennsylvania. Recently there were Canadians overnight at the Florian Park who thought they knew of other Kuznias in Manitoba. After contacting them, they were to let us know. They weren't heard from again.

Many times, other names look or sound the same. Kuzina is often mistaken for Kuznia. There are many Kuzmas around and also Kuzniars.

The Kuznia Reunion
...How It All Began

In 1975 during the preparation for the nation's bicentennial, Marshall County decided to collect the histories of its early pioneer families. It was then that my husband, Mike, and I decided that his grandparents, Albert and Hedwig Kuznia, should definitely be a

part of the histories of that book. We started to contact some of the older grandchildren, probing for bits and pieces of information about the grandparents.

Mike's dad. Mike Sr., had just passed away the year before, and in the last few years before his death, I had gathered little bits of information from him and already recorded them in a small notebook. Some years earlier, 1969, at the Elizabeth Kuznia and Bob Belch wedding, I had found out that Elsie Kuznia had been working on a family tree for a number of years already. The search for information about Albert and Hedwig also led me to her door, begging to copy what family tree information she had. Since she came from the family of Frank and Rozalia, that was the portion she had most complete. Other families I was more familiar with from the Florian area, I had more recent information about. So, we did some trading of information. I have always been most grateful for all the work on the tree she had already accomplished, and when the gathering of the tree for the Kuznia Reunion really got underway, it certainly proved helpful.

Also about this time, Kenneth C. Kuznia had approached me on the street in Stephen and said Sandy was interested in the family's histories, and would I share information I had? Sandy wrote the Peter Kuznia history for the Marshall County Book. I don't recall if we made any mention about a reunion to each other at this time.

Anyway, while doing the collecting of Albert and Hedwig's history, somehow or other, ideas for a reunion got tossed around --always talking in terms of the 100 year anniversary of their coming to America. It was a grand dream, as dreams go; I never quite dared think it might come true!

Then, in 1978, Stephen celebrated their centennial, and we knew K.C. Kuznia had a lot to do with helping plan the celebration. In other words, "He had experience." And we needed an experienced person to organize our dream.

Knowing it was getting later into 1978 and 1981 wasn't "really" all that far away, at Allen Kuznia and Grace Woinarowicz's wedding on September 9, 1978, we put the idea to K.C. He was receptive and enthusiastic! He said the first planning meeting should be held before the year ended. It wasn't!

On February 6, 1979, K.C. Kuznia, Ray Kuznia, Mike and I met at our house. We were on our way! After looking at the family tree and first selecting thirty-five names, the selection was then whittled down to a steering committee of ten people: K.C. Kuznia, Raymond Kuznia, Lillian Kuznia, Ambrose Kuznia, Ronald Kuznia, Elsie Kuznia, Edmund Pietruszewski, Barbara Kuznia, George Kuznia, and Rudy Kuznia to represent the Minneapolis area. The first general meeting of the Kuznia Reunion Steering Committee was held at our home on February 25, 1979. Officers were elected:

Chairman - K. C. Kuznia; Vice Chairman - George Kuznia; Secretary - Barbara Kuznia; Treasurer - Ronald Kuznia.

The family tree had to be gathered, and at the same time a directory of addresses had to be compiled for the correspondence that would have to take place. Many family members contributed their time to this project.

Second order of business for the steering committee was a family crest. Barb Kuznia and I had sent to researchers of heraldry to have them research the Kuznia coat of arms, but we were disappointed with their designs and even more so with the explanations. After some modifications, a crest I had designed during the nation's bicentennial was accepted by the Reunion Steering Committee at the March 25, 1979, meeting at Elsie Kuznia's. The crest was then taken to the printer, and stationery was printed for the reunion.

At the very first meeting, February 25, it was motioned that each member of the steering committee should donate \$25 so that we would have some funds with which to begin work. But, it soon became obvious more money would be needed to finance such a celebration. During night feedings of our infant daughter, Maribeth, an idea came to me. Why not make a family tree quilt with all 1.725 names upon it and sell chances to family members to raise the funds we'd need? This idea was accepted at the April 22, 1979, meeting at the Lawrence Kuznia home.

A book committee was chosen, with Elsie Kuznia and I as co-chairmen. The members of the book committee were: Robert Borowicz, Theresa Nelson, Elizabeth Kasprowicz,

Rosalia Stusynski, Hilary, Linda, Kathleen, and Gerri Kuznia. In the fall of 1979, it was felt work should get underway to collect the histories of the descendants of Albert and Hedwig. Probably inexperience in collecting data for a book and family members not believing deadlines were important were the biggest headaches for the members of the book committee. Much time was spent corresponding with family members, at the courthouse, and at the church parish house trying to compile interesting bits of information.



Epilogue -- "Summing It Up"

Having been in on the planning of the Kuznia Reunion and working on the family book leaves a person feeling good. It gives a person a great pride in their family name and in the ancestors who have gone before us.

We are sure some of Grandma Hedwig's straightforwardness, strong will, and corrections weren't always appreciated by the grandchildren; but when we look back over her lifetime and dwell for a moment on the events of the life she and Albert lived together, you can't help but marvel!

Here was a woman who married young in a country where political and economic conditions were terrible, to say the least. She raised a portion of her family for a few years on her own while her husband was off in a strange country. She risked sea travel with little children on a vessel that was less than pleasant. She came to a new country where her native language, Polish, wasn't spoken. She gave birth to sixteen children in the span of twenty-three years and saw death take four of them. She had no running water, indoor bath facilities, automatic washing machine, ready-made bread, freezer, dishwasher, disposable diapers, automobile, microwave oven, frozen pizza, T.V. dinners, or vacations.

If we could trade a couple of days of our daily routine in 1981 with a couple of days of her routine in 1887, we would really understand her. A sod home probably still was her shelter. A baby one-year-old and another baby on the way -- twins, to be exact. Water to be brought from the Tamarac River, meals to be prepared on a crude stove, stacks of wash to be done by hand for nine people -- including a baby still in diapers. Is there any doubt why prayer was a constant companion? Without prayer, she could never have carried on.

In these days of inflation, we should probably look back at Albert and Hedwig as an example; tighten our belt, put up our chin, wear our shoes a little longer, pray our rosary a little more -- or a lot more. Maybe then the future generations of the descendants of Albert and Hedwig will look back at our example and admire our courage, fortitude and prayerfulness and be thankful they don't have to trade places with us for a day.

Much work has gone into collecting the family tree, and we have no idea if ever again anyone will make an attempt to gather the descendants of Albert and Hedwig together. One thing is certain: If they do, the task will be even greater than it was this time. So, we ask each family to send us updated information about your families each year at Christmas time. Tell us of any deaths, births, and spouses, and please use full dates. Thank you!
